2014 US-Islamic World Forum

WORDE will be hosting a working group in this year's Brookings' <u>US- Islamic World Forum</u> conference in Doha, Qatar from June 9-11, 2014. This year's Forum is entitled "Islam and Inclusion" and will focus on challenges and solutions to inclusion issues relevant to Islam and global Muslim communities in the context of governance, academia, religious institutions and civil society. Our working group, "Empowering Pakistan's Civil Society for Countering Violent Extremism," brings together a diverse range of stakeholders, including US and Pakistani policymakers, CVE experts and analysts, leaders of the Pakistani American Diaspora as well as representatives of Pakistan's civil society. Forum will include expert working groups to produce policy recommendations on topics of mutual interest to the United States and Muslims around the world. The <u>topics this year</u>, related to the theme of inclusion, are Islamic principles of governance for post-conflict countries, countering violent extremism in Pakistan, and strategies for using Islamic tradition to overcome social and political challenges faced by European and American Muslims.

USPAK President Irfan Malik will participate in the working group of this conference, to cover efforts of Pakistani American Diaspora in empowering Pakistan's Civil Society for Countering Violent Extremism. More Information about the Forum.

Internship at Woodrow Wilson – Middle East Program

The Woodrow Wilson International Center is looking for Interns for Middle East Program. Internship Description

Interns will be assigned to work directly with the Middle East Program Staff in support of project activities for **20 hours per week**. This is an unpaid internship. Duties will include:

- searching for source material at area institutions and online sources (short and long term projects as assigned);
- analyzing, summarizing and filing research materials;
- proofreading and editing written work;
- attending and reporting on Middle East-related events in and around Washington;
- helping Middle East Program Staff manage and update the database;
- maintaining Middle East Program website;
- assisting staff in preparing public events, including managing mailing lists, RSVPs, and physical setup;
- preparing Program materials and publications.

Eligibility Requirements

Interns should have an interest in the Middle East, preferably with some coursework related to, and/or experience working on Middle East issues. He/she should have basic computer skills on a variety of software platforms. Excellent research skills and an enthusiastic, responsible approach to unsupervised work are strong assets. Those with excellent writing and/or editing skills are strongly encouraged to apply. Fluency in Arabic or Farsi preferred but not required. A Call for Change to the National 9/11 Memorial Museum al-Qaeda video

TCTHS director David Schanzer calls for changes to the National 9/11 Memorial Museum al-Qaeda video in his recent post "The 9/11 Museum & Islam" on ISLAMiCommentary. Schanzer says, "There is a way to talk about 9/11 that accurately reflects the religion of the perpetrators, explains why they attacked, and avoids conflating the religion of Islam with the ideology of al-Qaeda extremism. It is not too late for the museum to back down and achieve all of these important goals." "To devise an acceptable way to talk about 9/11, we have to be guided by certain truths," he says, and "problems arise when we fail to make these important distinctions." Read the full article here.

Pakistan: Islamist Parties Foster Violence and Intolerance

At <u>a recent event</u> at The Heritage Foundation, Haroon K. Ullah discussed the influence of Islamist political parties in Pakistan, the subject of his new book, *Vying for Allah's Vote: Understanding Islamic Parties, Political Violence, and Extremism in Pakistan*.

Ullah's research found that, contrary to popular belief, attacks in Pakistan are not random but rather part of a calculated strategy for Islamist parties to bribe voters for their security. He explained that Islamist parties rely on violent attacks in a way that makes security a form of patronage. The Islamists seek to convey to voters that if they support the Islamist parties, they will receive protection from further attacks Read More

Pakistan's Sectarian Problem and the Plight of Religious Minorities

Wilson Center, Washington DC, June 04, 2014; 4:00pm — 5:15pm

In recent years, Pakistan—a Sunni Muslim majority country with Shia Muslim, Christian, and Hindu minorities—has been convulsed by sectarian violence. More than 2,000 people have been killed in sectarian attacks since 2008, and last year sectarian killings rose by more than a fifth from 2012. Farahnaz Ispahani, a Wilson Center Public Policy Scholar and former Pakistani parliamentarian and journalist, will discuss the roots of Pakistan's sectarianism and her broader Wilson Center project—an analysis of Pakistan's policies toward its religious minority populations (Muslim and non-Muslim) since independence.
